I have been so impressed by the way so many of you give back to the Lord through your ministry at Christ Church. It is a wonderful place because of your commitment to the Lord. This is what stewardship is. It's the way we steward the lives we have been given by God and it is the recognition that all we are and all we have is a gift from God. Living with an attitude of gratitude (rather than an attitude of entitlement) makes all the difference in our character and in the way we live. We often hear about stewardship as honoring God in the use of our time, talent, and treasure but I believe there is a fourth piece

that is crucial and that is honoring God in our attitudes. Scripture warns us to guard our hearts and our minds against anything that would separate us from the Lord and to keep any bitterness from taking root in us. This too is part of the stewardship of the life we have been given by God. There is a five step plan for stewarding our lives that spells out the acronym HEART that helps us to have our heart transformed to be like the heart of Jesus. We need to remember:

- He really owns it all.
- Every day is an opportunity
- Action is required
- Remember your blessings
- Thank Him

We can live in the heart of Jesus when we follow these steps. There is one place in scripture where God actually invites us to test him. It's in Malachi 3:10 where the Lord calls us to give back to him the first fruits of our labors not just our leftovers. He says: "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this says the Lord Almighty, and see if I will not throw open the flood gates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it."

We serve a God of abundance, and when we really trust him as Lord of our lives, every day is not only an opportunity, it's an adventure. I can't wait to see what He has in store for us at Christ Church as we seek to honor Him together.



## "Then and Now"

I am embarrassed to say that while I have attended our Diocesan Jonathan Daniels pilgrimage many times in the past, I did not attend this year's pilgrimage back in August. I was actually attending a conference in Atlanta that weekend. But, I did get a report from one of our faithful pilgrims here at Christ Church. He told me that he heard yet another inspiring message. This year the Rt. Rev. Santosh Marry encouraged our church to be passionate in our love for all mankind and restore harmony. He went on to say that we are here to love the Lord and our neighbor. Our parishioner attending this year told me that he always comes away enlightened by seeing something, hearing something, and feeling the love of the blessed community.

Thinking of personal enlightened experiences with this annual pilgrimage, I was honored to meet Gloria House and Ruby Sales back in 2013; the two women who were with Jonathan Daniels the day he was shot in 1965. While I believe both women are now in their 60's, I felt an overwhelming spirit of youth and awareness with a sense of flourishing faith about them; the very moment I met them. I first thought, - these women have lived through the pain and struggle that, I believe, is still at work today. Yet, they both seem to continue to live with and through that pain in their efforts to bring about peace. After speaking with them, I believe part of what encourages their faith is their awareness of the present moment, then and now. While this awareness can be, at best, uncomfortable, I believe God provides a sense of purpose within our faith while living through the pain of history.

We have two opportunities this month to share in solidarity our history with God's children and in a hope to flourish in our faith as a community. First, Gay Pride comes around this time of the year in Atlanta with the LGBT community. I will be serving as Deacon for the Pride Eucharist at All Saint's Episcopal Church on Thursday evening October 6th, in Atlanta at 7:30 p.m. I realize that is a week night and a drive! So, if you can't attend, I know you will be there in spirit as I represent our convocation. Second, The Beloved Community Commission, of which I have served as a member, will be hosting a pilgrimage that echoes our Diocesan pilgrimage to Hayneville AL for Jonathan Daniels on Saturday, October 22nd. Here is a wonderful note about this pilgrimage. It's right here in our front yard; no all-day bus rides to Alabama. My hope is that you will join the Dioceses of Atlanta in our quest and that we show our best in hospitality as the Beloved Community leads a pilgrimage through the Tubman African American Museum and at the historic Douglass Theater. Both of these events are well posted on our Diocesan website.

The Gospel story for the first Sunday in October (Luke 17:5-10) has a message that seems to call us into this show of solidarity. Jesus' believers seem to be pleading for more faith. However, Jesus reminds them of all the empowerment we can find in faith as small as a mustard seed; so much so, we can command an extraordinary act of nature. This leads me to believe that our faith (our flourishing desire for faith) can grow from the smallest of experiences of just being present in the moment; then and now.

# FROM THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH

## "A Word to the Church for the World."

Greetings from Detroit, a city determined to be revived. Greetings also from the city of Flint, where we are reminded that the gift of water has for many of our brothers and sisters become contaminated.

Here we have been exhorted to set our sights beyond ourselves and to minister to the several nations where we serve and the wider world.

We lament the stark joylessness that marks our present time. We decry angry political rhetoric which rages while fissures widen within society along racial, economic, educational, religious, cultural and generational lines. We refuse to look away as poverty, cruelty and war force families to become migrants enduring statelessness and demonization. We renounce the gun violence and drug addiction that steal lives and crush souls while others succumb to fear and cynicism, abandoning any sense of neighborliness.

Yet, in all this, "we do not despair" (2 Cor. 4:8.). We remember that God in Christ entered our earthly neighborhood during a time of political volatility and economic inequality. To this current crisis we bring our faith in Jesus. By God's grace, we choose to see in this moment an urgent opportunity to follow Jesus into our fractured neighborhoods, the nation and the world.

Every member of the church has been "called for a time such as this." (Esther 4:14) Let prophets tell the truth in love. Let reconcilers move boldly into places of division and disagreement. Let evangelists inspire us to tell the story of Jesus in new and compelling ways. Let leaders lead with courage and joy.

In the hope of the Resurrection let us all pray for God to work through our struggle and confusion to accomplish God's purposes on earth.





### DAUGHTERS OF THE KING


