FROM THE RECTOR: GOALS

The Vestry and Clergy at Christ Church do our best to listen to the Lord's direction for us and prayerfully discern a path forward for each new year. After the election of new vestry members at the Annual Parish Meeting, we have a retreat to develop our relationship as a leadership team, explore our role as disciples, evaluate what we have accomplished in the past year, and set goals for the year ahead.

During this year's retreat, in response to a 2018 goal, we reviewed and adopted a final version of the Five-Year Strategic Plan presented by our Strategic Planning Committee. The Committee identified three priorities for development of strategic goals for the next five years. These priorities include: (1) focusing efforts to attract a younger and broader demographic;

(2) maintaining and improving our historic buildings and grounds and better utilizing our facilities; and (3) nurturing a sense of community within our parish and in the broader community. In addition to these priorities, the committee recommended that we develop a vision statement that articulates where we hope to be in five years. This serves a different purpose than our current mission statement, although it is natural that the two would complement one another. During the retreat, we collaborated to discern our vision: “Christ Church is a growing Episcopal community of disciples of Jesus, committed in faith and dedicated to service.” The full text of our newly-adopted Strategic Plan and Vision Statement will be added to the church website in the new few weeks.

Many of the accomplishments of 2018 have already been noted in the Christ Church Annual Report. Three unanticipated bonuses last year were establishment of the Cloister Shop, the recovering of kneelers in the church nave, and the completion of needlepoint work on altar chairs in Jones Chapel. Spearheaded by Lynn Waggoner, the Cloister Shop makes Christian resources and gifts easily accessible to parishioners in a vibrant, bustling environment at the entrance to the Parish House. Julie Edge performed excellent work in recovering all of the kneelers in the nave. Karen Yarbrough worked throughout the year to needlepoint exquisite crosses that now grace the altar chairs in Jones Chapel. Thanks to all of these women for sharing their special talents with our parish. A detailed evaluation of the Vestry’s completed 2018 goals will soon be posted on the website for your review.

Vestry goals for 2019 build on recent accomplishments and expand to new areas of emphasis. These goals include: (1) being more intentional in our welcome of newcomers, reaching out to downtown residents, continuing to improve our communication and website, and producing a new printed directory for members; (2) enhancing parish operations by updating the Employee Policy manual, creating procedures for staff review, and establishing a Finance Committee to oversee financial stewardship and explore additional financial opportunities through the parish and outside resources; (3) addressing barriers to diversity by having all vestry members complete diocesan Dismantling Racism Training, developing the paired clergy relationship that Cynthia has just entered, and establishing a committee to document and raise awareness of our historical role in the community and larger Church; (4) improving our physical plant with new and handicap-accessible restrooms for the Chapel and Parish House, making the Chapel handicap accessible through the use of a removable ramp, installing a new rack in the church narthex for informational materials, increasing our energy efficiency, and addressing drainage issues in the alley; and (5) implementing our strategic plan.

We continue our commitment to parishioners of all ages by providing opportunities for spiritual and personal growth through excellent Christian education and worship as well as opportunities to exercise our faith through service and prayer. Your clergy and vestry always welcome your input and suggestions for our church ministries. To increase access, we will hold “town hall-style” meetings twice a year to answer questions and address any concerns people may have. Vestry meetings are open to parishioners, and meeting minutes are kept in a notebook in the Cloister Room and are also posted on the whiteboard outside the Cloister Shop.

It is a privilege to lead such a wonderful, vibrant parish. I hope you will delve deeper in your faith this Lent by practicing the Spiritual Disciplines and exploring the liturgy of the ordinary, being more mindful of our relationship with the Lord in everyday activities. I look forward to sharing with you the observance of Holy Week, culminating in the joyful celebration of our Lord’s resurrection on Easter Sunday!

COMFORTABLE WORDS

Many Episcopal churches, including the one I serve as associate at, choose to use the Rite 1 liturgy for Lent. While Rite 1 can be tricky because we are unaccustomed to its prayers and its Elizabethan English, there is much to commend in it. One of the best things about using Rite 1, is that it allows us to hear “Cranmer’s Comfortable Words.” [Thomas] Cranmer’s Comfortable Words were not penned by the founding father of the Anglican tradition. Instead, they are sentences of Holy Scripture that Cranmer strategically placed within the prayer book liturgy, immediately following the confession and absolution. The prayer book instructs, “A Minister may then say one or more of the following sentences.” Often times, only one is said, (perhaps because our knees are sore from kneeling!). However, Dr. Ashley Null, an Episcopal theologian, argues that the four sentences come as a set and act as a miniature of the gospel of grace by faith. (Null’s commentary follows each sentence.)

Hear the Word of God to all who truly turn to him.

Come unto me, all ye that travail and are heavy laden, and I will refresh you. (Matthew 11:28)

“Cranmer’s Comfortable Words do not begin with God’s wrath. ... Rather, the first [comfortable word] focuses on hurting humanity—with its felt needs, its longing for wholeness.”

God so loved the world, that he gave his only-begotten Son, to the end that all that believe in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. (John 3:16)

“Having used Jesus’ own words to acknowledge the depth of human longing for good news, Cranmer’s second Comfortable Word now turns again to Jesus to establish the depth of God’s own longing to respond.”

This is a true saying, and worthy of all men to be received, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners. (1 Timothy 1:15)

“Cranmer’s third Comfortable Word circles back to the human condition. Humanity suffers from spiritual fatigue because that is merely the most noticeable fruit of human sinfulness.”

If any man sin, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; and he is the perfect offering for our sins, and not for ours only, but for the sins of the whole world. (1 John 2:1-2)

“Previously, 1 Timothy 1:15 described salvation from the human perspective. We need a savior, for our sins have cut us off from God, leaving us weary and wanting. Now 1 John 2:1-2 explains salvation from God’s perspective. Because of Christ’s self-offering on the cross, our sins are fully forgiven.”

So as we keep Lent, using Cranmer’s Comfortable Words, allow them to sink deep into your heart, knowing that they are a reminder of the steadfast love that God has for you and a reminder of how his son Jesus Christ demonstrated that love by giving himself on our behalf.

Back Courtyard – PreK, K

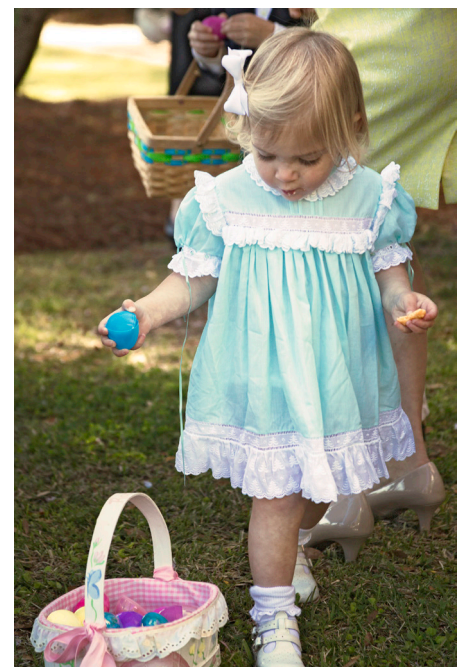
Front Courtyard – 3 year olds and younger

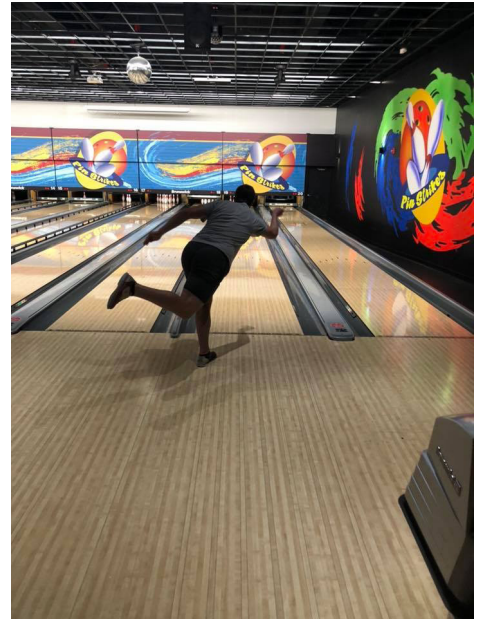

WORSHIP: PALM SUNDAY, HOLY WEEK, & EASTER

The week before Easter is a time of special devotion for Christians. As Episcopalians, we shift the liturgical color from purple to red and mark the events of Christ's last days with specific readings and liturgies. The week opens with Palm Sunday, the celebration of Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem. This joyful occasion quickly shifts during the service to the reading of the Passion Narrative, which records the trial of Jesus and the call of the crowd for his crucifixion. We celebrate Eucharist daily on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday with specific proper readings. During the Easter Triduum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, we prepare for the Holy Feast of Easter – the day of Christ's resurrection. Maundy Thursday marks Christ's washing of the Disciples' feet, the institution of the Eucharist, and the betrayal of Judas. On Good Friday, we observe the crucifixion of Jesus. Holy Saturday commemorates the day Jesus visited among the dead while his body lay in the sealed tomb. This day ends with the Easter Vigil, the first service of Easter. Holy Week concludes with the celebratory services of Christ's resurrection on Easter Sunday.

This year at Christ Church, we are intentionally observing Maundy Thursday with one service, to be held at 6:00 p.m. We invite everyone, young and old, to join together for this most significant liturgy. During the service, we will participate in the ceremony of foot washing, recalling how Jesus humbled himself to wash the feet of the Disciples, to be the servant rather than the one served. Through this observance, we recall Jesus' teaching to "love one another just as I have loved you." If you are reluctant to have your feet washed, please don't let that keep you from attending this service. The foot washing is entirely optional, and you may participate by simply watching. The service continues with the Eucharist and concludes with the stripping of the altar. This component of the service is incredibly moving, as clergy and altar servers carefully remove all of the chancel and altar elements – flags, crosses, scripture books, kneeling pads, candles, linens, anointing oils, and Communion service pieces. The Reserve Sacrament is moved to a table in the nave for use during the Good Friday service. The altar is washed and laid bare, the Tabernacle door left open to reveal its emptiness. The lights are dimmed, and worshippers leave the church in darkness and silence. Please make every effort to join us for this service. Child care will be provided. I promise you this recognition of the death of Jesus will add emphasis to the joy of Easter and the realization of new life in our risen Christ.

Each year, Christ Church and St. Paul's celebrate the Easter Vigil together, and this year, the service will take place at St. Paul's at 5:00 p.m. on Saturday. Combining the choirs, readers, altar servers, and clergy of both churches, we observe this service by lighting the Paschal Candle from a new fire, recalling the promises of God to his people, and celebrating the first Eucharist of Easter. The Vigil was traditionally the time to baptize new Christians, and this year, Clive and Rory Neubauer, children Zac and Erica Neubauer, will be baptized during the Easter Vigil service.

About Daybreak:

Daybreak is a day center for people experiencing homelessness. Daybreak is a place where men and women who live homeless can escape the streets to a place that offers a warm welcome and the services they need to move toward lives of stability and dignity. Services offered include hygiene — showers and laundry, meals, access to tech services, education, employment readiness, case management, and healthcare.

Daybreak is a day/resource center offering individuals access to showers, telephones, computers, laundry services, a medical clinic, and case managers.

Who Daybreak helps:

Adult individuals facing homelessness--on the street, in tents, or housing "insecure."

How Daybreak Helps:

Giving a hot morning meal, safe place to relax during the day, and access to resources to help individuals move from homelessness to a life of hope and dignity.
