Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., and we remember our presidents that were so critical in the early formation of our country. It is important to us as a Church to remember those saints who have gone before us who have shaped our lives individually and as the Church and to be mindful of the legacy we leave for those who will come after us. In the front page of the January Chimes I spoke about the weekend of February 9th and 10th where we will be addressing the process of grieving—grieving the loss of loved ones and other kinds of loss. More about the schedule and content of that weekend is inside this newsletter. On the three Sundays after that (Feb. 17, 24, and March 3) we are doing a three-part presentation called “When the Saints Go

FROM THE RECTOR (*CONT.*)

Marching In". I have found in ministering to families who have lost a loved one that they can feel crushed by all the work involved in planning after their loved one has died, especially being burdened with the planning in the midst of their grief. Grief can be debilitating. Adding an overwhelming amount of decisions and arrangements to make, especially in areas that are unfamiliar to them is especially difficult. One of the great gifts we can give those we love is to make decisions and arrangements for that eventuality when our life on earth is ended. It is something better done now while we are of clear mind and know what we would want rather than to leave that to someone else to manage. This is true of financial arrangements, burial arrangements, and planning your service. Your funeral is your final witness to your faith. People will come to that service that won't set foot in a church for any other reason. While you have already entered the gates of heaven you have the opportunity to be impacting someone you love in a way that assures you will meet again someday because you have taken the time to choose what was meaningful to you in Scripture, in music, and in your witness if you would like to leave one. The first Sunday of this series, Boone Smith will be talking about financial preparations that covers everything from planning for your own needs, to planned giving and tax advantages in the arrangements you have made in your estate. The second Sunday Milton Heard from Hart's and Phil McGoldrich from Snow's will be talking about the ins and outs of planning for burial. I will ask them to bring with them some entertaining stories- there are many as truth is stranger than fiction- but also to give us the straight talk about options available. (I have known grown children who felt the need to buy the mahogany casket to do right by Dad when all he wanted was a pine box.) The third Sunday we will be talking about planning our own service. This is not sad or grim when you are alive and well. It is an opportunity to think about and record what Scriptures are meaningful to you and what hymns speak of your faith. I have offered this course before and it was both well attended and extremely appreciated so we will be holding this during the Sunday School hour (10:00 pm) in the Great Hall. If you would like to do any advance preparation, take a look at the burial service in the Book of Common Prayer (pp. 469/491). It is my personal opinion

that we are blessed with a uniquely beautiful and uplifting liturgy for funerals that is a great blessing to those who are left behind.

The Safe Spaces Committee of Christ Church will begin meeting again this winter to develop concrete suggestions the Vestry can adopt to make the church property more secure for our children and families while at the same time Christ Church can continue to offer gospel hospitality to our community. We're reaching out to other churches in Macon and also other parishes in the Diocese of Atlanta to explore how they are addressing this same challenge. One way we can immediately offer better security on Sundays is to encourage everyone to use the Cloister garden entrance to the Parish House. This keeps the unattended Parish House front door from remaining unlocked or open, which allows free and unobserved access to the Children's Sunday School hall and the back staircase to the Great Hall. This is not meant to inconvenience anyone, and the front doors remain available for emergency exit purposes. The Cloister garden entrance also offers a ramp for those who may need to avoid stairs. We thank you for your cooperation and invite your prayers for our work.

GOD'S GRACE

Recently (January 31st), the Episcopal Church celebrated the life of one of the heroes of our tradition, Rev. Sam Shoemaker. Sam Shoemaker was an influential rector of a parish in New York City. "During his tenure, Calvary's ministry grew exponentially, largely through Shoemaker's ability to hold in creative tension the power of personal evangelism and giving authentic witness to one's faith while remaining faithful to the liturgical and sacramental traditions of the church" (Holy Men, Holy Women). Shoemaker was also instrumental in the founding of Alcoholics Anonymous. He later became the rector of Calvary Church in Pittsburgh with the intention "to make Pittsburgh as famous for God as it is for steel" Shoemaker was also an author and one of his quotes has always stuck out to me.

"The best kind of human goodness does not arise out of efforts at self-reformation of a conscious kind: it arises spontaneously out of gratitude to God for His goodness to us, out of sheer love of Him. Goodness is a by-product. Grace is the main thing."

Brothers and sisters. Remember, grace is the main thing. If anything is worth doing, we must have God's grace to do it.


