

RECTOR'S MESSAGE *Putting Together the Pieces*

I have just returned from the youth pilgrimage to England where we learned so much about the ancient roots of our faith and some of the challenges the church in England faced along the way. The tumultuous path of the church during the period of the Reformation in England (1527-1603) and the ensuing English Civil War (1642-1651) between the Royalists and the Parliamentarians, were times of great upheaval, change and even destruction within the church in England. In many of the great cathedrals we visited, we saw the results of the puritan vandalism during the civil war when stained glass windows were destroyed, statues removed and

the colors that originally adorned the ceilings and walls of the cathedrals were stripped away. While this was a painful and violent time in the history of the church, it led to the development of the Act of Toleration (1689) that protected religious dissenters from persecution and allowed for greater religious freedom, promoting individual rights and tolerance. While originally very limited in its scope, that Act of Toleration paved the way for religious freedom and diversity in England and in other nations throughout the world. The hardships and strife of that period have resulted in the freedoms we enjoy and the eventual development of the Episcopal Church of which we are a part.

The huge West window in the front wall of Winchester Cathedral is a wonderful illustration of God taking our brokenness and failings, and through His divine grace, making them into something beautiful. On arriving at the Cathedral, the first of many stops on our pilgrimage, we were struck by the incongruence of what looked to be a very contemporary window, in an 11th century cathedral. One of the docents at the cathedral told us the story. During the English Civil war in 1642, Winchester's location on two major roadways put it right at the heart of the conflict. The puritans (Parliamentarians) took out their anger on the cathedral, prying open the caskets of the early kings and bishops in search of treasure, and finding none, throwing the bones at the beautiful stained glass windows and using them for target practice. When the vandals had left, the townspeople went about collecting the broken shards of glass and bones of the dead to save them until things had settled down and the work of restoration could begin. Eventually bones were restored to the caskets, if not necessarily the ones they had come from, and the great West window was reconstructed of the broken pieces of glass, a testimony to the violence that had taken place there and the hands




of the faithful that had taken such pains to put the pieces back together to make a beautiful window for their beloved cathedral. It was a work of art before its time telling the story of the brokenness and the redemption that had taken place within those walls.

If I had it to do again, I think I may have just sat in that Cathedral for a time. I would spend time in prayer and thanksgiving for the way the Lord takes our brokenness, our failings, and our woundedness, and pieces them together through his divine love, grace, and mercy to make something beautiful that bears witness to His love and grace in our lives. The story of His redeeming love is so much more powerful and a much greater gift to those we encounter than any individual beauty we might hope for. Sometimes the light shines brighter through those broken shards than it ever would have through a perfectly constructed window. After all its not about us, it's about the way we bear witness to God's story of love and redemption. That is the greatest of all stories of which it is a privilege to be a part.




ship with others! Thank you, thank you to everyone who came together to make VBS possible, through donations, prayer, and in-person!

2025 Youth Pilgrimage

What an incredible journey our pilgrims took through England this summer learning and discovering the history of our church and building lifelong friendships and memories throughout our 8 days. We laughed until we had tears in our eyes and we endured moments of struggle but we went through all of these highs and lows together as a group and I don't think any of us would change a thing!

We started our pilgrimage by landing in London at around 7:00am and immediately hitting the road to Winchester (we really fought through jet lag!) where we explored Winchester Cathedral and the town before heading to our lodging for the next two nights, a monastery where we were hosted by a group of five Franciscan nuns. The next day we took a day trip to Salisbury where we explored the wonders of Stonehenge and got to see the magnificent Salisbury Cathedral. The next day, we headed out for 3 days in Canterbury, but were able to spend a day in Dover on the way where we stood in awe of the Cliffs of Dover and explored the history of Dover Castle. The next three nights in Canterbury included visiting St. Martin's Church (the oldest English speaking church in the world!) touring and attending multiple services at Canterbury Cathedral, going on a punting boat tour, and cooking for each other each night at our hostel! After Canterbury, we made our way to London for two day of exploring the sights, attending services at Holy Trinity Brompton and Westminster Abbey and even sitting in a Cantonese service at St. Martin in The Field.

We were able to see so much during our 8-day pilgrimage through England! Ray Ross said, "It was really fun to go see how other people worship and all the beginnings of what would become the Episcopal Church" which I think perfectly encapsulates our journey!





day's passage. We are looking for short devotions on the scripture of the day of between 300-500 words. Scan the QR code to be taken to the sign up list.




Memorial Garden Visitations


New Alpha Course On Wednesday Evenings This Fall Beginning on August 6

Book '**Em** is a local 501(c)(3) corporation which partners with the Bibb County Sheriff's Office to deliver

books to children/youth in our community who might otherwise have none. Christ Church parishioner Katie Powers serves as its executive director.

To date, Book 'Em has delivered over 60,000
brand-new books to children/youth in Macon-Bibb County. This partnership with the BCSO
helps to foster a positive relationship between our local law enforcement officers and the community. Book 'Em also provides books to

several local organizations including our own Weekend Lunch Program, the Booker T. Washington Community Center, the Bibb Solicitor's Office, and partners with other local non-profits such as MVP grant recipient Lead with Literacy.

Every dollar donated goes toward the purchase of new books. Donations can be made via <u>maconbookem.org</u> or by sending a check to **Book 'Em** at 3557 Vineville Avenue, Macon, 31204.

Why is this so important? More than 43% of all children in Macon-Bibb are growing up in poverty. Most of these children have very few, if any, books in their homes. Consider this statistic: in low-income neighborhoods there is approximately **one book for every 300 children**. In **middle** income neighborhoods there are approximately **13 books per child in each household**. Access to books is fundamental to developing reading skills. Studies confirm that the number of books in the home directly affects reading achievement levels. Perhaps the most disturbing fact of all is that many municipalities plan the number of jail cells needed in the future by the percentage of students in their schools who cannot read fluently by the end of their 3rd grade year.
