RECTOR'S MESSAGE

A year of faithfulness and growth

"In your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you, yet do it with gentleness and respect." — 1 Peter 3:15

In looking back on this year what stands out to me the most is the growth we are experiencing with new people of all ages becoming an active part of our community of worship and faith. While certainly it is the Lord who provides the growth, I believe it is also testimony to your faithful witness. While some have simply found us by searching online, many have said they were invited by friends who are members here, or that many of their favorite people go to Christ Church. In other words, it is the faithfulness of your witness that is so attractive.

People come to the Lord because they are wooed by him. It is the power of attraction that draws people to following Christ, not a good argument. When people see Christ in your life, they want that too. When people see the peace of God that passes understanding keeping you calm and joyful when we are living in crazy times, they want to know what anchors you. When you are going through personal struggles but seem to be rising above them because of your faith in the Lord who holds the future in His hands, you bear witness to the hope that is within you.

We have been wrestling for years now with how to do evangelism Episcopalian style. The Lord must have been laughing as we wrestled in those conversations trying to figure out what to do, because the Lord was already working through your faithfulness to spread the good news. When you care for those in need by serving in various ministries in our community, you bear witness to your faith in the Lord. When you take time out of your busy schedule to come to worship on Sundays, have your children in Sunday School, and even yourself go to Bible Study, you are bearing witness to your faith. When you serve in the church not because you should but because it is a joy for you, you bear witness to your faith. When you give back to the Lord sacrificially with your time, talent, and treasure, you bear witness to your faith. When you have committed to raise your children within a community of faith alongside other parents in fellowship with that faith-filled community, you bear witness to your faith. When you extend a welcome to people you don't

know when they come into church, or when you invite a friend to come to church with you, you bear witness to the hope that is within you. This year we have been seeing the fruit of your faithfulness, and it has been and continues to be a great blessing. You are the reason we are seeing such growth. It is Christ in you. It didn't even require serving on a committee, just living in faithfulness and bearing witness to the one who gives you life, love, joy and peace.

Even as I sit writing this a parishioner stopped by who has been living this out who just happened to be wearing one of the Christ Church t-shirts from our fall retreat. It made me smile to see such a concrete example of what I was in the process of reflecting on!

The storms of this world continue to rage around us. We still face personal loss, stresses caused by finances, challenging relationships, illness or injuries, and we constantly deal with things that would distract us from what is most important. But in holding Christ as Lord above all else in our hearts and in our minds, He holds us steady, lifts us up so we don't get stuck in the mire, and all those other concerns and distractions become subject to His far greater power at work in our lives. We are truly blessed to be living in Christ and living as part of this wonderful body of Christ that is Christ Church. I rejoice to see you inviting others to be a part of our family of faith, and to see you welcome the stranger with such warmth and compassion. You are truly a witness to the steadfast love of the Lord. You have been sealed by the Holy Spirit and even though the mark from baptism may be invisible, the light of Christ within you shows as you live for Him!

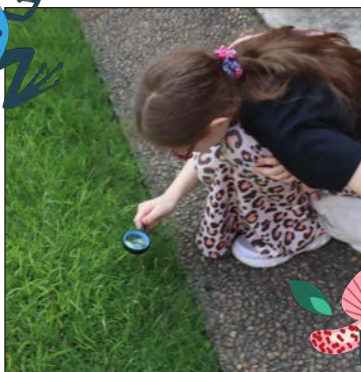

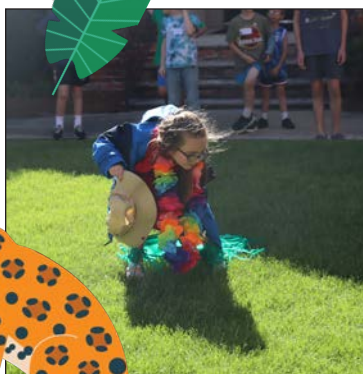

2026 Parish Retreat at Camp Mikell

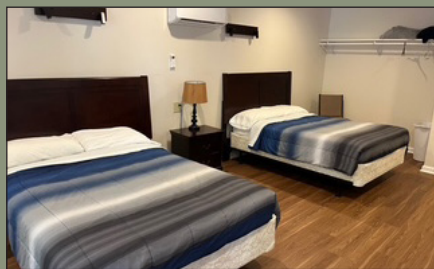
"Treading upon the heights"

While at first it seemed like this year was destined to live in the shadow of last year's Bicentennial Celebration, the 2025–2026 program year turned out to be a busy and eventful year in its own right. In every way, the people of Christ Church have shown their willingness not just to appreciate the foundation laid by past generations, but to build upon it to continue this parish as a house of worship, service, and love in the heart of Georgia for years to come.

The following pages are a month-by-month review of everything that has happened in the past year with pictures from all our church's many activities since the program year began last August. Laid out like this, it is easy to see what a full year it's been. From the holy days of the Church calendar like Christmas, Easter, All Saints' and Pentecost, to beloved annual gatherings like the Blessing of the Animals, the Parish Picnic, and the Shrove Tuesday Supper,

to our children and family events like All Hallows' Eve, the St. Nicholas service, and Vacation Bible School, this year was full with all the worship, joy, and fellowship we've come to expect at Christ Church. In addition, this year brought

new, special experiences. We held two service projects to serve our downtown Macon neighbors with sandwiches and hygiene bags. We invited Allen Levi, the Columbus-based author of the novel *Theo of Golden*, to give a talk that attracted over 400 attendees from around the Southeast. We held two parish retreats, one to Kanuga, the Episcopal camp and conference center in the mountains of Hendersonville, North Carolina, and one on the island of St. Barths. And we celebrated the Centennial of our Parish House, which was constructed in 1926, by excavating a time capsule that was built into its cornerstone and by gathering our own time capsule to document our Bicentennial Celebration.

It has also been a year of incredible growth. We are blessed with an active and vibrant community across all age groups, from our youngest children to the Seasoned Saints. We have had so many new members that we had to hold two newcomer parties this year and in April Bishop Wright confirmed thirteen youth and thirteen adults. We look forward to seeing what this community's love and dedication and God's faithfulness will bring in the year to come.

Shortly after, the Choir School of Macon began its new year in September, nurturing the next generation of musical talent through our St. Cecilia Choir and our older Choristers.

Throughout the year, our spirits were consistently uplifted not just by congregational hymns and organ preludes, but by unforgettable special events. Our fall was anchored by a magnificent Organ Concert and Choral Evensong on the C.B. Fisk organ, and our holiday season was made all the more beautiful by the cherished service of Advent Lessons and Carols in December. As we moved into winter and spring, our souls were fed by intimate Choral Evensongs in Jones Chapel and the Church, and a glorious Spring Confirmation

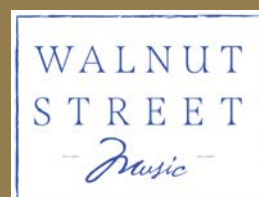

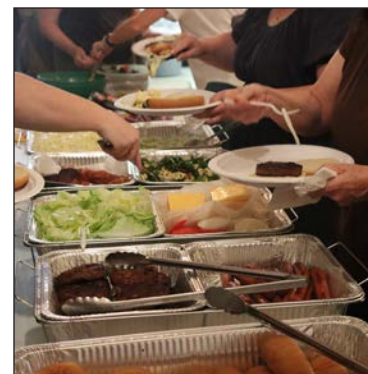

Registration for EfM Opens in mid-July

Education for Ministry (EfM) is a program of lay theological education that offers an intensive, systematic exploration of the Christian faith. It consists of four year-long programs covering, the Old Testament, the New Testament, Church history, and ethics and spirituality. The programs follow the academic year and consist of a curriculum of readings and weekly two-hour discussions on Zoom. The next session begins on the Monday after Labor Day and registration opens in mid-July.

Education for Ministry lives at the School of Theology of the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee. It is a unique four-year, small-group formation program based on study and practice in theological reflection. Since its founding in 1975, this international program has helped more than 120,000 participants discover and nurture their call to Christian service where they

live, work, and play. EfM helps the faithful discover the Christian tradition, bringing it into conversation with their experiences of the world. EfM seminar groups develop theologically informed, reflective, and articulate seekers of God.

Many people have been taught that one must be ordained to be a minister, but our vows at baptism say something different: that all baptized Christians are ministers. God calls us to be active participants in ministry. What is that ministry? As the Church, we are called to continue the ministry of Jesus. We are called to be the hands, heart, and incarnate body of Christ in our own place through worship, reflection, service to others, and by the proclamation of God's Word to all people.

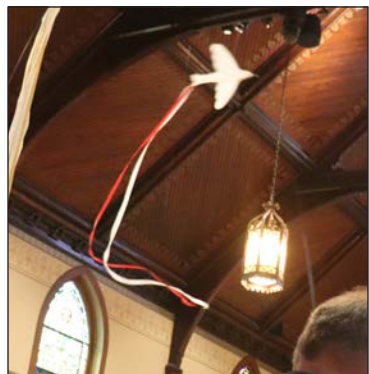

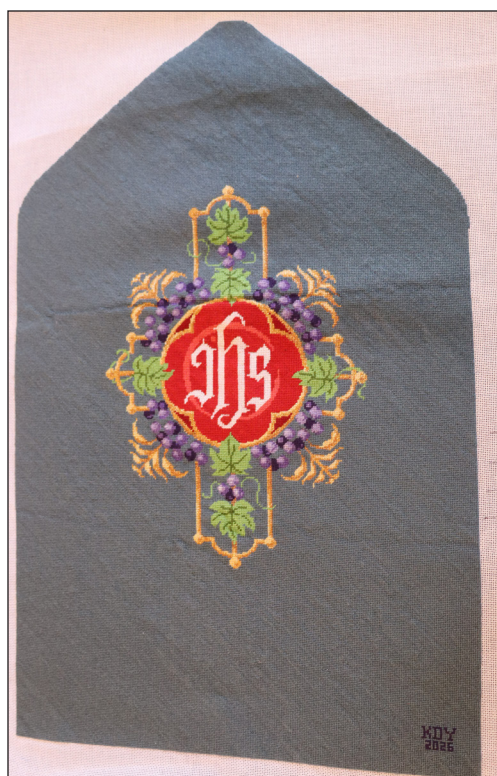

Karen Yarbrough has recently completed this exquisitely embroidered needlepoint design, which will be installed as the back cushion for the tall chair on the pulpit side of the altar, to complement the bishop's chair on the lectern side which has the crest of the Diocese of Atlanta embroidered on its back cushion. This design features a cross surrounded by grapes and wheat, representing the bread and wine of the Eucharist, and the trigram "IHS," which comes from $\text{I}\text{H}\text{C}\text{H}\text{O}\text{Y}\text{C}$, the name of Jesus in Greek. This needlepoint work will join dozens of other embroidered cushions and kneelers which have been crafted with skill and dedication by generations of Christ Church members.

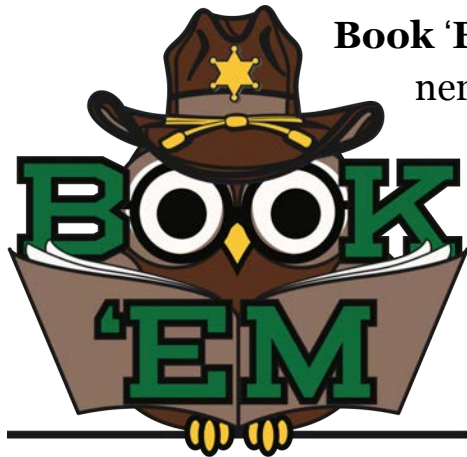

Book 'Em is a local 501(c)(3) corporation which partners with the Bibb County Sheriff's Office to deliver books to children/youth in our community who might otherwise have none. Christ Church parishioner Katie Powers serves as its executive director.

To date, Book 'Em has delivered over 60,000 brand-new books to children/youth in Macon-Bibb County. This partnership with the BCSO helps to foster a positive relationship between our local law enforcement officers and the community. Most recently Book 'Em held a book distribution at Rosa Taylor Elementary School. Each of the school's 405 students was able to select four brand-new books to keep in an effort to prevent "summer slide."

Why is this so important? More than 43% of all children in Macon-Bibb are growing up in poverty. Most of these children have very few, if any, books in their homes. Consider this statistic: in low-income neighborhoods there is approximately **one book for every 300 children**. In middle income neighborhoods there are approximately **13 books per child in each household**. Access to books is fundamental to developing reading skills. Studies confirm that the number of books in the home directly affects reading achievement levels. Perhaps the most disturbing fact of all is that many municipalities plan the number of jail cells needed in the future by the percentage of students in their schools who cannot read fluently by the end of their 3rd grade year.
